# **MINUTES:**

**1.** May 20, 2020 Regular Meeting Minutes were approved as amended on a motion by Mr. Boynton, seconded by Mr. Ramos. All were in favor.

#### **ORDINANCES:**

2020-08 BOND ORDINANCE BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR VARIOUS 2020 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS, BY AND IN THE TOWNSHIP OF FRELINGHUYSEN, IN THE COUNTY OF WARREN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY; APPROPRIATING \$230,750 THEREFOR AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$219,210 BONDS OR NOTES OF THE TOWNSHIP TO FINANCE PART OF THE COST THEREOF BE IT ORDAINED AND ENACTED BY THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF FRELINGHUYSEN, IN THE COUNTY OF WARREN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY (not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring) AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The improvements or purposes described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are hereby authorized as general improvements or purposes to be undertaken by the Township of Frelinghuysen, in the County of Warren, State of New Jersey (the "Township"). For the said improvements or purposes stated in Section 3, there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$230,750, said sum being inclusive of a down payment in the amount of \$11,540 now available for said improvements or purposes required by the Local Bond Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:2-1 et seq., as amended and supplemented (the "Local Bond Law"), and now available therefor by virtue of a provision or provisions in a previously adopted budget or budgets of the Township for down payment or for capital improvement purposes.

SECTION 2. For the financing of said improvements or purposes described in Section 3 hereof and to meet the part of said \$230,750 appropriation not provided for by said down payment referred to in Section 1 hereof, negotiable bonds of the Township are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$219,210 pursuant to the Local Bond Law. In anticipation of the issuance of said bonds and to temporarily finance said improvements or purposes, negotiable notes of the Township in a principal amount not exceeding \$219,210 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.

SECTION 3. (a) The improvements hereby authorized and purposes for the financing of which said bonds or notes are to be issued is for the 2020 Capital Improvement Program, which includes, but is not limited to: (i) the acquisition of miscellaneous fire and related equipment for use by the Green Township Fire Department; (ii) the acquisition of turnout gear for use by the Blairstown Fire Department; (iii) the acquisition of self-contained breathing apparatus (scba) bottles and a Task Force Tips Blitzfire portable monitor for use by the Hope Fire Department; (iv) the resurfacing of Greendell Road within the Township and various repairs and improvements related thereto, all as part of the Greendell Road Resurfacing Project; (v) the acquisition of street signs, plows, a sander and miscellaneous tools for use by the Department of Public Works; (vi) the acquisition and installation of miscellaneous office furniture for use in the town hall; and (vii) various improvements and upgrades to the Recreational Field, including, but not limited to, the ball field (backstops/fencing, etc.). Such improvements or purposes shall also include, as applicable, all engineering and design work, surveying, construction management services, preparation of plans and specifications, permits, bid documents, contract administration, and all work,

materials, equipment, labor and appurtenances necessary therefor or incidental thereto, all in accordance with the plans therefor on file in the office of the Township Clerk and available for public inspection and hereby approved.

- (b) The estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued for said improvements or purposes is \$219,210.
- (c) The estimated cost of said improvements or purposes is \$230,750, the excess thereof over the said estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued therefor being the amount of \$11,540, which is the down payment available for such improvements or purposes.

SECTION 4. In the event the United States of America, the State of New Jersey, and/or the County of Warren make a contribution or grant in aid to the Township for the improvements or purposes authorized hereby and the same shall be received by the Township prior to the issuance of the bonds or notes authorized in Section 2 hereof, then the amount of such bonds or notes to be issued shall be reduced by the amount so received from the United States of America, the State of New Jersey and/or the County of Warren. In the event, however, that any amount so contributed or granted by the United States of America, the State of New Jersey and/or the County of Warren shall be received by the Township after the issuance of the bonds or notes authorized in Section 2 hereof, then such funds shall be applied to the payment of the bonds or notes so issued and shall be used for no other purpose. This Section 4 shall not apply, however, with respect to any contribution or grant in aid received by the Township as a result of using funds from this bond ordinance as "matching local funds" to receive such contribution or grant in aid.

SECTION 5. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the Chief Financial Officer of the Township, provided that no note shall mature later than one (1) year from its date or as otherwise authorized by the Local Bond Law. The notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the Chief Financial Officer of the Township. The Chief Financial Officer of the Township shall determine all matters in connection with the notes issued pursuant to this bond ordinance, and the signature of the Chief Financial Officer of the Township upon the notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. All notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time in accordance with the provisions of the Local Bond Law. The Chief Financial Officer of the Township is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the notes from time to time at public or private sale and to deliver them to the purchaser thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price and accrued interest thereon from their dates to the date of delivery thereof. The Chief Financial Officer of the Township is directed to report in writing to the governing body at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of the notes pursuant to this bond ordinance is made. Such report must include the principal amount, the description, the interest rate, and the maturity schedule of the notes so sold, the price obtained and the name of the purchaser.

SECTION 6. The Capital Budget of the Township is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this bond ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency herewith. In the event of any such inconsistency, a resolution in the form promulgated by the Local Finance Board showing full detail of the amended Capital Budget and capital programs as approved by the Director of the Division of Local Government Services, New Jersey Department of Community Affairs will be on file in the office of the Clerk of the Township and will be available for public inspection.

SECTION 7. The following additional matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:

- (a) The improvements or purposes described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are not current expenses and are improvements which the Township may lawfully undertake as general improvements, and no part of the cost thereof has been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefited thereby.
- (b) The average period of usefulness of said improvements or purposes within the limitations of the Local Bond Law, according to the reasonable life thereof computed from the date of the said bonds authorized by this bond ordinance, is 8.38 years.
- (c) The Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the Office of the Clerk of the Township and a complete executed duplicate thereof has been filed in the Office of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services, New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, and such statement shows that the gross debt of the Township as defined in the Local Bond Law is increased by the authorization of the bonds or notes provided for in this bond ordinance by \$219,210 and the said bonds or notes authorized by this bond ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law.
- (d) An aggregate amount not exceeding \$2,000 for items of expense listed in and permitted under Section 20 of the Local Bond Law is included in the estimated cost indicated herein for the improvements or purposes hereinbefore described.

SECTION 8. The full faith and credit of the Township are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and the interest on the bonds or notes authorized by this bond ordinance. The bonds or notes shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the Township, and the Township shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable real property within the Township for the payment of the bonds or notes and the interest thereon without limitation as to rate or amount.

SECTION 9. The Township reasonably expects to reimburse any expenditures toward the costs of the improvements or purposes described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance and paid prior to the issuance of any bonds or notes authorized by this bond ordinance with the proceeds of such bonds or notes. No funds from sources other than the bonds or notes authorized herein have been or are reasonably expected to be reserved, allocated on a long-term basis or otherwise set aside by the Township, or any member of the same "Controlled Group" as the Township, within the meaning of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-1(e), pursuant to its budget or financial policies with respect to any

expenditures to be reimbursed. This Section 9 is intended to be and hereby is a declaration of the Township's official intent to reimburse any expenditures toward the costs of the improvements or purposes described in Section 3 hereof to be incurred and paid prior to the issuance of bonds or notes authorized herein in accordance with Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2, and no further action (or inaction) will be an abusive arbitrage device in accordance with Treasury Regulation Section 1.148-10 to avoid the arbitrage yield restrictions or arbitrage rebate requirements under Section 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"). The proceeds of any bonds or notes authorized herein used to reimburse the Township for any expenditures toward the costs of the improvements or purposes described in Section 3 hereof will not be used directly or indirectly (i) to "refund" an issue of governmental obligations within the meaning of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-1(d), (ii) to create, within one year, following the reimbursement of any expenditures of bond proceeds "replacement proceeds" within the meaning of Treasury Regulation Section 1.148-1 of the bonds or any other bond issue, or (iii) to reimburse the Township for any expenditure or payment that was originally paid with the proceeds of any obligation of the Township (other than borrowing by the Township from one of its own funds or the funds of a member of the same "Controlled Group" within the meaning of Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-1(e)). The bonds or notes authorized herein to reimburse the Township for any expenditures toward the costs of the improvements or purposes described in Section 3 hereof will be issued in an amount not to exceed \$219,210. The costs to be reimbursed with the proceeds of the bonds or notes authorized herein will be "capital expenditures" in accordance with the meaning of Section 150 of the Code and Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-1. This provision will take effect immediately, but will be of no effect with regard to expenditures for costs paid outside the permitted reimbursement period set forth in Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2(d)(2).

SECTION 10. The Township covenants to maintain the exclusion from gross income under Section 103(a) of the Code of the interest on all bonds and notes issued under this bond ordinance.

This bond ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after the first SECTION 11. publication thereof after final adoption, as provided by the Local Bond Law. Motion was made by Mr. Ramos to open to first reading for introduction, seconded by Mr. Boynton. Roll call vote: Mr. Boyntonyes; Mr. Desiderio-yes; Mr. McPeek-yes; Mr. Ramos-yes; Mr. Stracco-yes. Second reading for adoption will be held on June 17, 2020. Motion was made by Mr. Boynton to open for 2<sup>nd</sup> reading for adoption, seconded by Mr. Ramos. All were in favor – aye. Motion was made by Mr. Boynton to open to the public, seconded by Mr. McPeek. Public comment: Dan Kohuth questioned the line item for Greendell Road and why there was no dollar amount given and also thought that the township bonded for that work in 2019 bond ordinance and was confused as to why we were putting in for it this year. He also asked why it was being completed in 2 installments. Ms. Dyer explained the bond ordinance for 2020 and stated that the total was \$147,000.00, which \$130,000 was the DOT grant monies and \$17,000 was for the municipal portion. Mr. Sterbenz also explained that this is the first of 2 grants that have been obtained so far. In answering Mr. Kohuth for why in 2 installments, Mr. Sterbenz explained that by merging the project together was more than the DOT grants were for. A third grant has been requested and submitted. We are waiting for that funding round. He also explained that due to the pandemic it wasn't feasible to do all together at this time. Mr. Stracco added that the town was concerned the state might not have the monies to reimburse the town and that is why we amended the capital ordinance to include the monies for paving. Ms. Dyer stated that the town incurred the debt upfront in case the state was delayed in payment. Mr. Kohuth also asked what specific funding was allocated as it is not stated in the capital ordinance. Ms. Dyer explained that during the last meeting the specifics were broken down and Mr. Ramos agreed and said that all funding had been discussed in previous meetings. There were no further questions. Motion was made by Mr. Boynton to close to the public, seconded by Mr. Ramos. All were in favor – aye. Motion was made by Mr. Boynton to approve for adoption, seconded by Mr. McPeek. Roll call vote: Mr. Boynton-yes; Mr. Desiderio-yes; Mr. McPeek-yes; Mr. Ramos-yes; Mr. Stracco-yes. This Ordinance will be effective 20 days after publication date.

#2020-09 ORDINANCE CREATING A NEW CHAPTER 24 OF THE FRELINGHUYSEN TOWNSHIP CODE, IMPOSING A TAX AT A UNIFORM PERCENTAGE RATE ON CHARGES OF RENT FOR THE OCCUPANCY OF A ROOM OR ROOMS IN A HOTEL WHEREAS, pursuant to P.L. 2003, c. 114 (N.J.S.A. 40:48F-1), the governing body of a municipality is authorized, through the adoption of an ordinance, to imposing a tax at a uniform percentage rate not to exceed three (3%) percent on charges of rent for every occupancy on or after July 1, 2004 of a room or rooms in a hotel or motel; and WHEREAS, the Township of Frelinghuysen desires to amend the Frelinghuysen Township Code to add a new Chapter 24, "Hotel and Motel Room Occupancy Tax," imposing a tax of three (3%) percent on charges of rent for every occupancy of a room or rooms in a hotel or motel. NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Committee of the Township of Frelinghuysen as follows: **Section I** 1. The Frelinghuysen Township Code is amended by adding thereto a new Chapter 24, to read as follows: Chapter 24 Hotel and Motel Room Occupancy Tax SECTION 24-1 CHAPTER TITLE. This Chapter shall be known and may be known as the "Hotel and Motel Room Occupancy Tax of the Township of Frelinghuysen." SECTION 24-2 **PURPOSE.** It is the purpose of this article to implement the provisions of P.L. 2003, c. 114,<sup>[1]</sup> which authorizes the governing body of a municipality to adopt an ordinance imposing a tax at a uniform percentage rate not to exceed 3% on charges of rent for every occupancy on or after July 1, 2004, of a room or rooms in a hotel subject to taxation pursuant to Subsection (d) of Section 3 of P.L. 1966, c. 40 (N.J.S.A. 54:32B-3). SECTION 24-3 DEFINITIONS. Hotel

or Motel: A building or portion thereof which is regularly used and kept open as such for the purpose of furnishing sleeping accommodations and related services for pay to tourists. transients, or travelers. It includes, but is not limited to, the following: A. An apartment hotel or motel, bed-and-breakfast, motel, inn, tourist home, tourist house or court, tourist cabin and club; B. A boardinghouse or rooming house containing eight or more units; and C. Any other building or group of buildings in which sleeping accommodations are normally available to the public on a transient basis. **Professionally managed unit:** A room, group of rooms, or other living or sleeping space for the lodging of occupants in New Jersey, that is offered for rent as a rental unit that does not share any living or sleeping space with any other rental unit, and that is directly or indirectly owned or controlled by a person offering two or more units for rent during the calendar year. **Residence:** A house, condominium, or other residential dwelling unit in a building or structure that is designed, constructed, leased, rented, let or hired out, or otherwise made available for use as a residence. Transient Accomodation: A room, group of rooms, or other living or sleeping space for the lodging of occupants, including but not limited to residences or buildings used as residences. However, it does not include: A. A hotel or hotel room; B. A. room, group of rooms, or other living or sleeping space used as a place of assembly. C. A dormitory or other similar residential facility of an elementary or secondary school or a college or university. D. A hospital, nursing home, or other similar residential facility of a provider of services for the care, support and treatment of individuals that is licensed by the state. E. A campsite, cabin, lean-to, or other similar residential facility of a campground or an adult or youth camp. F. A furnished or unfurnished private residential property, including but not limited to condominiums, bungalows, single-family homes, and similar living units, where no maid service, room service, linen-changing service, or other common hotel services are made available by the lessor, and the rental transaction is executed by a real estate broker licensed by the New Jersey Real Estate Commission pursuant to N.J.S.A. 45:15-1 et seq., and where the keys to the property, whether a physical key, access to a keyless locking mechanism, or other means of physical entrance to the property, are provided to the lessee at the offsite location of the licensed real estate broker. G. Leases of real property with a term of at least 90 consecutive days. Transient space marketplace: An online marketplace through which a person may offer transient accommodations or hotel rooms to individuals. It allows transient accommodations or hotel rooms to be advertised or listed through an online marketplace in exchange for consideration or provides a means for a customer to arrange for the occupancy of the transient accommodation or hotel room in exchange for consideration. A transient space marketplace does not include an online marketplace operated by or on behalf of a hotel or hotel corporation that facilitates customer occupancy solely for the hotel or hotel corporation's owned or managed hotels and franchisees. Unit: Any portion of a building which is, or may be, rented or leased separately to any individual or family. **SECTION 24-4 TAX ESTABLISHED.** A. There is hereby established a hotel and motel room occupancy tax in the Township of Frelinghuysen, which shall be fixed at a uniform percentage rate of 3 percent on charges of rent, on or after the adoption of this Ordinance and publication as provided by law, of a room or rooms or unit or units in a hotel, motel, transient accommodation offered through a transient space marketplace, and professionally managed unit subject to taxation pursuant to Subsection (d) of Section 3 of P.L. 1966, c. 40, N.J.S.A. 54:32B-3 (sales tax). B. The hotel and motel room occupancy tax shall be in addition to any other tax or fee imposed pursuant to statute or local ordinance or resolution by any governmental entity upon the occupancy of a hotel room. SECTION 24-5 EXEMPTION. The hotel and motel room occupancy tax authorized herein shall not be imposed on the rent for an occupancy if the purchaser, user or consumer is an entity exempt from the tax imposed on an occupancy under the "Sales and Use Tax Act" pursuant to Subsection (a) of Section 9 of P.L. 1966, c. 30 (N.J.S.A. 54:32B-9). SECTION 24-6. SPECIAL STATUTORY PROVISIONS; PENALTY. In accordance with the requirements of N.J.S.A. 40:48F-2: A. All taxes imposed by this article shall be paid by the purchaser. B. A vendor shall not assume or absorb any tax imposed by this article. C. A vendor shall not in any manner advertise or hold out to any person or to the public in general, in any manner, directly or indirectly, that the tax will be assumed or absorbed by the vendor, that the tax will not be separately charged and stated to the customer, or that the tax will be refunded to the customer. D. Each assumption or absorption by a vendor of the tax shall be deemed a separate offense, and each representation or advertisement by a vendor for each day that the representation or advertisement continues shall be deemed a separate offense. E. The penalty for violation of the foregoing provisions shall be a \$1,250 fine for each offense. **SECTION 24-7 COLLECTION OF TAX.** The tax imposed by this article shall be collected on behalf of the Township of Frelinghuysen by the person collecting the rent from the customer. Each person required to collect the tax herein imposed shall be personally liable for the tax imposed, collected or required to be collected hereunder. Any such person shall have the same right in respect to collecting the tax from a customer as if the tax were a part of the rent and payable at the same time; provided that the Chief Financial Officer of the Township shall

be joined as a party in any action or proceeding brought to collect the tax. **SECTION 24-8 ENFORCEMENT.** The Chief Financial Officer or his/her designee shall enforce the provisions of this article requiring that the tax be collected and paid to the Township. This may be accomplished in any manner permitted by law including civil litigation. SECTION 24-9. VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES. In addition to the special provisions and penalty provided in this article, any person who violates, or who fails or refuses to comply with this article, shall be liable for penalty, upon conviction thereof, as provided in this Code of the Township of Frelinghuysen under Section \_ of such Code of Ordinances. SECTION 24-10. **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This article shall take effect immediately upon final passage and publication as provided by law. The tax provisions of this article shall take effect on the first day of the first full month occurring 90 days after the date of transmittal by the Township Clerk of a certified true copy of this article by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the New Jersey State Treasurer; to the New Jersey State Division of Taxation at the following address: 50 Barrack Street, P.O. Box 628, Trenton, New Jersey 08695; and to each hotel and motel located within the Township of Frelinghuysen. Notice of adoption shall be published as provided by law. Section II 1. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are repealed to the extent of such inconsistency. 2. If any word, phrase, clause, section or provision of this ordinance shall be found by any Court of competent jurisdiction to be unenforceable, illegal or unconstitutional, such word, phrase, clause, section, or provision shall be severable from the balance of the ordinance and the remainder of the ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

#2020-40 RESOLUTION REQUESTING GOVERNOR MUPRHY RELEASE DISCRETIONARY FUNDS FOR THE RELIEF OF COVID-19 EXPENSES IN WARREN COUNTY AND THEIR MUNICIPALITIES WHEREAS, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act was passed by Congress with overwhelming, bipartisan support and was signed into law by the President on March 27th, 2020; and WHEREAS, the CARES Act provided payments to State, Local, and Tribal governments navigating the impact of the COVID-19 outbreak in the following amounts to counties in NJ:

She discussed each section and steps needed to take place and explained that there will be a new updated map as the current one is dated 2008. She let the township know that they have met their 10 year goal and has preserved approximately 2300 acres. Mr. Ramos asked how our total preserved acres compares to surrounding towns, in particular Hope and Hardwick. Ms. Davis will get that information back to the committee. Motion was made to open to the public by Mr. Boynton, seconded by Mr. Ramos. All were in favor aye. There was no public comment. Motion was made by Mr. Boynton to close to the public, seconded by Mr. Ramos. All were in favor aye. Mr. Stracco thanked Ms. Davis for the updates and an excellent presentation.
- Paul Sterbenz, Maser consulting, discussed Greendell Road Phase I and asked for authorization to proceed. Motion was made by Mr. McPeek to authorize Mr. Sterbenz to proceed, seconded by Mr. Boynton. Roll call vote: Mr. Boynton-yes; Mr. Desiderioyes; Mr. McPeek-yes; Mr. Ramos-yes; Mr. Stracco-yes.
- He discussed the salt shed plans and the next steps are to submit plans to SHIPO. Mr.
  Ramos explained the plans that were drawn up and asked for any alterations or
  suggestions from the committee prior to Mr. Sterbenz submitting to SHIPO. Mr.
  Ramos asked that all look at the plans and have any recommendations for the July 8<sup>th</sup>
  work session. After the work session the plans can go to SHIPO.
- Mr. Sterbenz also discussed the 2021 Municipal Aid program and asked which road they would like to submit an application for. After discussion, Mr. Desiderio made a motion for Mr. Sterbenz to go forward with the application for 2021 for Camp Wasigan Road, seconded by Mr. Boynton. All were in favor. Mr. Sterbenz will submit the application.

# **DEPARTMENT REPORTS:**

Motion was made by Mr. Boynton for a consent agenda for department reports 1-9, seconded by Mr. McPeek. All were in favor.

DPW - discussed during the clerk's report.

Land Manager - nothing new to report.

Recreation committee – Mr. Ramos explained that soccer signups were going to start but no monies will be collected until it is certain there will be a season. Practices can start on

Monday. Mr. Ramos also mentioned the fire pit rules and regulations and would like to be placed on the agenda for the work session. Ms. Zilberfarb apologized for leaving that off the agenda.

Environmental Commission - no meeting.

Farmland/Open space Committee – no meeting

Historic Committee – no meeting.

#### **OPEN MEETING TO THE PUBLIC:**

Motion was made by Mr. McPeek, seconded by Mr. Boynton to open meeting to the public limited to 20 minutes with 3 minutes per member of the public. All were in favor. Spoke were:

- Marty Conner inquired that last month IDT energy coop was discussed and thought that
  it was being placed on the agenda for the future. Ms. Zilberfarb explained that it will be
  put on the agenda but won't be discussed until late fall.
- Dan Kohuth inquired about roadside mowing and how far back they mow. Mr. Kohuth
  felt that on Kerrs Corner Road they are going higher than normal and back further than
  normal and wanted to know if there is a specification on how far they are to mow. Mr.
  McPeek stated that the State and County do that type of mowing all the time. Mr.
  Stracco asked Ms. Zilberfarb to check into this. Mr. Boynton commented that they
  should be conscientious and that would improve the life of the mower.

Motion was made by Mr. Boynton, seconded by Mr. McPeek to close to the public. All were in favor.

#### **EXECUTIVE SESSION:**

Motion was made by Mr. Boynton, seconded by Mr. Mcpeek to enter into executive session.

No action was taken.

Motion was made by Mr. Boynton, seconded by Mr. Ramos to exit executive session.
