ORDINANCES:

#2019-06 **ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 13-1.4(1)(c) OF THE FRELINGHUYSEN TOWNSHIP CODE CONCERNING ENGINEERING AND INSPECTION FEES ASSOCIATED WITH DRIVEWAY PERMITS** WHEREAS, the Frelinghuysen Township Mayor and Committee have determined that it is necessary and appropriate at this time to revise Section 13-1.4(1)(c) of the Frelinghuysen Township Code, which sets establishes the amount of the engineering and inspection fee escrow associated with applications for roadway openings sought by parties constructing, reconstructing, repairing or resurfacing a driveway which enters onto a Township road. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Committee of the Township of Frelinghuysen, County of Warren, State of New Jersey as follows: Section I Section 13-1.4(1)(c) of the Frelinghuysen Township Code is amended to read as follows:

(c) A check in the amount of eight hundred (\$800.00) ~~four hundred (\$400.00)~~ dollars to cover the cost of engineering and inspection fees (“engineering and inspection fee escrow”). Section II

1. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

2. If any word, phrase, clause, section or provision of this ordinance shall be found by any Court of competent jurisdiction to be unenforceable, illegal or unconstitutional, such word, phrase, clause, section, or provision shall be severable from the balance of the ordinance and the remainder of the ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final passage and publication as required by law.

#2019-07 ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING MAP AND LAND USE REGULATIONS OF THE TOWNSHIP OF FRELINGHUYSEN AT BLOCK 501, LOTS 9, 10 AND 11 FROM “AR6” ZONE CLASSIFICATION TO “NC” ZONE

CLASSIFICATION WHEREAS, the Township of Frelinghuysen desires to amend its Zoning Map and land use and development regulations to re-designate certain property on the Zoning Map located at Block 501, Lots 9, 10 and 11 from the present zoning classification of “AR6” (Residential) to the “NC” (Neighborhood Commercial) zone classification; and WHEREAS, the Mayor and Township Committee believe that such rezoning is consistent with the Zoning Ordinance and Master Plan of the Township, and would provide for appropriate development on these respective parcels of a type, density and scale that is consistent with the surrounding properties. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Committee of the Township of Frelinghuysen, County of Warren, State of New Jersey as follows: Section I

1. The Zoning Map of the Township of Frelinghuysen is hereby amended as follows: **Block 501, Lots 9, 10 and 11** are hereby rezoned from “AR6” (Residential) to the “NC” (Neighborhood Commercial) AR6 to NC.

2. The Zoning Map is hereby considered and shall be amended to reflect the depiction of the above zoning changes. The official map of the municipality shall not take effect until filed with the county recording officer as per N.J.S.A. 40:55D-16. Section II If any part of this Ordinance shall be deemed invalid by an administrative agency or court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the legality and enforceability of any other provision hereof. Section III All ordinances, policies and/or procedures or parts thereof in conflict or inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed, but only however, to the extent of such conflict or inconsistency. Section IV Pursuant to the Municipal Land Use Law, the Clerk is directed to give notice at least ten (10) days prior to the hearing on the adoption of this ordinance to the County Planning Board pursuant to the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40:55D-15. Upon the adoption of this ordinance after public hearing thereon, the Municipal Clerk is further directed to publish notice of the passage thereof and to file a copy of this ordinance with the County Planning Board as required by N.J.S.A. 40:55D-16. Section V Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:55D-62,1, notice of scheduled the hearing date and this ordinance shall be given at least ten (10) days prior to the hearing by the Municipal Clerk by either personal service or certified mail and regular mail to the owners of all real property as shown on the current tax duplicates, located, in the case of a classification change, within the district and within the State within two hundred feet (200’) to all directions of the boundaries of

the district, and located in the case of a boundary change, in the State within two hundred feet (200') in all directions of the proposed new boundaries of the district. Section VI This Ordinance shall take effect upon final passage and publication as provided by law, however, subsequent to first reading, this ordinance must be referred to the Township Land Use Board for review, which shall be based on whether the proposal is substantially consistent with the Master Plan. The Land Use Board has a period of thirty-five (35) days after referral to report on the proposed ordinance. #2019-61 A RESOLUTION OPPOSING PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT IN WHITE

TOWNSHIP WHEREAS, a project consisting of 6 million square feet in warehouse and other uses to be located in White Township has been presented to the White Township Planning Board; and WHEREAS, it has been estimated that the proposed project will result in a dramatic increase in truck traffic in Frelinghuysen Township and throughout Warren County; and WHEREAS, many of the roads that would inevitably be impacted by the proposed project are already among the most heavily congested in Warren County; and WHEREAS, the increase in traffic, damage to roadways, increase in response time for emergency personnel, and general diminution in the quality of life resulting from the project will affect not only White Township, but also all of the surrounding municipalities, including but not limited to Frelinghuysen Township; and WHEREAS, there is a lack of sufficient infrastructure to support the proposed project, resulting in an undue burden to Frelinghuysen Township and other surrounding municipalities; and WHEREAS, as stated in Warren County’s 2018 Transportation Technical Study, “transportation and land use decision making must be grounded in a firm understanding of existing conditions and context” and shall include an examination of the “reasons, needs, assets, deficiencies, goals and priorities.” NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Township Committee of the Township of Frelinghuysen, County of Warren, State of New Jersey, that the Township of Frelinghuysen hereby expresses its grave concerns over the proposed warehouse project, which concerns include, but are not limited to, the loss of quality of life, reduction of property values, impact on police, fire and rescue squad response time, and general quality of life. AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this Resolution shall be forwarded to Congressman Gottheimer, the Warren County of Chosen Freeholders, the members of the 23rd and 24th legislative districts, the Clerks of each municipality located within Warren County, the New Jersey League of Municipalities and the New Jersey Conference of Mayors. #2019-64 A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING A MANAGEMENT AND LAND USE AGREEMENT WITH THE NEW JERSEY AUDUBON SOCIETY AT FRELINGHUYSEN FOREST PRESERVE PURSUANT TO N.J.S.A. 40:12-20, ET SEQ. WHEREAS, the Mayor and Committee of the Township of Frelinghuysen (hereafter the "Township") own and operate the Frelinghuysen Forest Preserve (hereafter "FFP"); and WHEREAS, included within the Township is the FFP, a 280-acre property located in the Township of Frelinghuysen that provides a mix of active and passive recreation, including hiking trails, forests and natural areas, sledding, picnic areas, camping areas, amphitheater, comfort stations, and a nature and environmental center; and WHEREAS, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:12-20, et seq., the State of New Jersey recognizes the needs of municipalities and counties to enter into agreements to rehabilitate, improve, and maintain their parks, and thus authorizes municipalities and counties to establish mutually beneficial partnerships, through an agreement, with nonprofit organizations that will result in parks that are better maintained, operated, and improved for the use and enjoyment of the public; and WHEREAS, the New Jersey Audubon Society is a nonprofit organization that fosters environmental awareness and conservation ethic among New Jersey's citizens, protects New Jersey's birds, mammals, other animals, plants, especially those that are endangered and threatened species, and promotes preservation of New Jersey's valuable natural habitats; and WHEREAS, the New Jersey Audubon Society has a professional staff with expertise in conservation policies, programs, and stewardship activities that could aid in the Township's long-term preservation of FFP and ensure its viability and health; and WHEREAS, the Township is desirous to enter a management and land use agreement with the New Jersey Audubon Society to aid the Department in its stewardship of FFP, and allow the Township to take advantage of the subject matter expertise of the New Jersey Audubon Society and its staff, as well as grant opportunities administered by the United States Department of Agriculture, benefiting wildlife habitat by providing cost-sharing for conservation work, as well as the technical expertise to install, monitor, and manage plantings for wildlife. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Township Committee of the Township of Frelinghuysen, County of Warren, State of New Jersey, as follows:

1. The Management and Land Use Agreement for the FFP with the New Jersey Audubon Society annexed hereto and made part of this Resolution is approved.

AGREEMENTS:

The Land Use Agreement with the FFP and the NJ Audubon Society was discussed. After discussion, a motion was made by Mr. Boynton to authorize the mayor and clerk to sign a 5 year agreement with an additional 5 year agreement term, seconded by Mr. Stracco. Roll call vote: Mr. Boynton-yes; Mr. Desiderio-yes; Mr. Marra-Yes; Mr. McPeek-yes; Mr. Stracco-yes. Ms. Zilberfarb will send to Mr. Cecil to have the agreement signed.

OLD BUSINESS:

- Mr. Stracco discussed the service electric issues and asked legal counsel if we can force a lapse in agreement or as a citizen can we sue? Mr. Wacks responded that a complaint can be issued on Service electric and the petition can be field with the office of cable television. He also said that yes a lapse in agreement can be forced if cable services continue to collect monies, and unfortunately as a citizen there is nothing known in New Jersey but there are cases in California. Mr. Stracco discussed hiring a consultant and have them survey where internet is provided and what the speeds are. It was also discussed about altise/optimum internet that is in Wantage, Byram and Frankin. Mr. Wacks explained that Allamuchy is going through the process now with this group and will get back to the committee with more information.
- Mr. Desiderio discussed the barn at the FFP and clarified that nothing can be touched on the building unless SHIPO is informed. He will be contacting SHIPO to discuss the building.
- Ms. Zilberfarb asked if the employee handbook revisions could be held until the new year as there is more information coming out that the insurance company would like included. She also mentioned that all committeemen will be taking a mandatory class this coming year regarding sexual harassment and molestation. The handbook will be held until January 2020.
- Mr. Desiderio let the committee know that he has not been able to reach the homeowner in regards to the standpipe on Ramsey Road. Ms. Zilberfarb will send a letter to the homeowner.
- Mr. Stracco discussed the herbicides utilized at the townhall and noted that no round up is being used.
- Knowlton Shared Municipal Court services was discussed in executive session.

NEW BUSINESS:

- Ms. Natayzak asked Mr. Wacks for further clarification on the sale of the township property as the recorded deed states \$148,500.00. Mr. Wacks explained that the auctioneer, Max Spann, asked for a number from the township and that number given for the sale was \$135,000. It was listed at \$148,500 with the 10% included (\$13,500) the township received \$135,000.00 for the sale of the land. He stated it is a traditional way for a sale for a farmer and that is why the deed reflects \$148,500.00.
- A letter of resignation was sent from Nick Pachnos effective January 1, 2020 that he will be resigning from all functions of OEM for the township. A motion was made by Mr. Stracco to accept with regrets, seconded by Mr. Boynton. All were in favor. A discussion was made and decided that a plaque of appreciation and a gift card for dinner will be purchased. Ms. Zilberfarb will make sure there are monies for this in the budget and let the committee know at the next meeting.
- Ms. Zilberfarb discussed the carpeting in the town hall and explained to the committee that they had not allocated enough to do the entire building. The offices in the front will be carpeted and the foyer, bathroom and file room will have vinyl flooring installed. Ms. Zilberfarb will ask for more monies at budget

time to replace the carpeting in the back. It was discussed about an odor and that she will look into having it deep cleaned until replacement. A motion was made by Mr. Boynton to accept the contract for the front offices of townhall, seconded by Mr. Marra. All were in favor. Ms. Zilberfarb will get in touch with the company and get the process started. She also explained to the committee that when they are doing the carpeting that she will need to work from the meeting room those days.

OPEN MEETING TO THE PUBLIC:

Motion was made by Mr. Stracco, seconded by Mr. Marra limiting it to 15 minutes to open meeting to the public. All were in favor. Spoke were:

- Julia Summers of the Highlands Coalition. She discussed briefly the benefits to joining the highlands coalition and handed all members information and asked that everyone consider joining.
- Debra Natyzak explained the odor will not go away in the back room as there is no ventilation in that room.
- Keith Ramos discussed dugouts and handed the committee photos of what he would like to do. He explained there would be no cost to the town to have these built as he has sponsors willing to pay for them. They would put a small plaque on the dugouts for each sponsor. He asked the committee for permission to have 5 concrete pads poured. A motion was made by Mr. Stracco to approve 5 concrete pads being poured, seconded by Mr. Marra. All were in favor. Mr. Ramos will meet the zoning officer and obtain the permits via the building department.
- Dan Kohuth mentioned that the township bonded \$6,000.00 for dugouts and asked about the interest we are paying on that bond.
- Mr. Kohuth asked about the ACO position and why all positions in the township were not being advertised. Mr. Wacks explained that all positions did not need to be advertised. Ms. Zilberfarb explained that she will be placing the ad in the paper for the position that the committee asked her to but had not yet as she needed clarification. She also stated that she was disappointed that a committeeman asked her to advertise for each position within the township. She discussed the cost to do this. Ms. Zilberfarb will advertise for the ACO position only and will receive resumes until December.

Motion was made by Mr. McPeek, seconded by Mr. Stracco to close to the public. All were in favor.

DEPARTMENT REPORTS:

Motion was made by Mr. Stracco for consent agenda for items 1-10, seconded by Mr. Marra. All were in favor.

DPW – Report is in the book. Ms. Zilberfarb let the committee know that stone will be dropped off in the back parking lot for the tar and chip of Lincoln Laurel and Heller Roads. She also mentioned that the backhoe extra warranty is coming due and if they'd like to renew it. She will have quotes for the October meeting as the warranty expires in November. She will also check to be sure there is funding available.

Land Manager – Nothing to report

Rec Center Coordinator – Nothing to report

Legal Report – Covered throughout the meeting.

Recreation Committee – Mr. Desiderio explained that the Boy Scout troop camped this past weekend at the FFP and that the Eagle Scout project is ongoing and going well. He also mentioned that all the fire alarms have been replaced in the lodge.

Farmland Preservation/Open Space Committee – Nothing to report

Historic Committee – Dick Stevens spoke at the meeting. He has knowledge of deeds for Sussex County going back to the 1730's.

Committeeman Boynton – Would like clarification on the date for Halloween. After discussion, Halloween is on the 31st for trick or treat hours of 4-8 pm. Recreation will let him know when the festivities at town hall will be. He also mentioned that Mr. Kuhn got married.

Committeeman Marra – Mr. Marra let the committee and public know that starting in 2020 in the state of NJ a homeowner will now need to have the water tested for radon which is an \$800.00 fee to the homeowner.

Committeeman McPeek – Nothing to report

Clerk report – Ms. Zilberfarb discussed the bees that nested in the concrete of the front steps and asked if anyone wanted to help patch them. She was told to call someone to fix the holes. She discussed that the letters were going out to the residents of Saddle Ridge Road for tree trimming and that she waited to make sure the dpw would be done patching the roads. She also discussed that a few residents had contacted her regarding their energy bill and asked to opt out. She will get in touch with Lisa from concord. She also let the committee know that Paul Sterbenz will be at the November meeting. Ms. Zilberfarb also asked that at the next meeting she would like a picture taken of the committee and individual committee members photos taken as well.
